The Department of the Army cultural resources program develops high-quality technical documents to assist installations with cultural resources management and compliance. These technical documents include Army-wide historic contexts, management plan and policy guidelines, and other important reference materials, many of which can be accessed online.

ARMY HISTORIC CONTEXTS

The Army has completed numerous historic contexts that identify and evaluate a range of historic properties and resources. They serve as a framework for determining the significance of particular types of resources based on chronology, theme, and place. This information also helps with National Register of Historic Places evaluation, as it includes analysis of National Register criteria, criteria considerations, and discussion of State and local significance.


The Army recognized the need to study Cold War-era historic resources and evaluate their historic significance. Currently available Cold War-era and other contexts are listed on the reverse of this page.

DEPARTMENT OF ARMY PAMPHLET 200-4

Department of the Army Pamphlet 200-4, Cultural Resources Management provides technical guidance for implementing Army policy as set forth in *Army Regulation 200-4, Cultural Resources Management*.

The pamphlet provides:

- Integrated Cultural Resources Management Plan (ICRMP) preparation guidelines;
- implementing guidance for regulatory and/or statutory compliance activities;
- prototype compliance agreements for Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) and for the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA);
- guidelines for Army consultation with Native Americans; and
- Army Historic Building Management Standards.

FEDERAL HISTORIC PRESERVATION CASE LAW, 1966-1996

Federal Historic Preservation Case Law, 1966-1996: Thirty Years of the National Historic Preservation Act summarizes court opinions on NHPA and other preservation statutes and Presidential Executive Orders. It

also provides an overview of 30 years of Federal historic preservation to put those opinions into context. Finally, the handbook addresses various procedural questions concerning preservation litigation.

HISTORIC LANDSCAPE GUIDELINES

Guidelines for Documenting and Evaluating Historic Military Landscapes: An Integrated Landscape Approach provides guidelines for identifying and evaluating historic military landscapes. It describes the unique processes and historical context of military installations, emphasizing the importance of relationships among the individual buildings, structures, and grounds that contribute to the military landscape. It also suggests a systematic landscape approach for documenting the evolution of a military installation and evaluating the significance of its contributing resources in a national military context.
