Habitat: Deep pools with many overhanging willows and intermixed fringe of cattails.

Up to 5.1 inches in length, the largest native frog in the western United States.

Young frogs have been observed to be active during the day and night, whereas adult frogs are mainly active at night.

Live 8 to 10 years.

Listed as threatened on May 23, 1996.
