

ENDANGERED SPECIES BOOKMARKS

Mexican Spotted Owl
(Strix occidentalis lucida)



Protected at Fort Huachuca and Camp Navajo (both in Arizona)

Habitat: Moderate to high canopy closure with large old-growth trees.

Eat mostly small rodents and small birds.

About 16 to 19 inches long; females are larger than males.

Nest in closed canopy forests or rocky canyons.

Listed as threatened on March 16, 1993.
